Road Captain's Report: Wavy, with deep regrets, said that he is stepping down from all positions for personal reasons. If anyone wants to step up and take these positions, Road Captain and Products, let the Board know.

Safety Director's Report: Johnny Rose talked about tire pressure, that when it gets cold the air pressure in your tires changes. Brad Winston said that experience has led him to always check the tire pressure, every single time he rides. Johnny Rose also said that it is a good idea to go over your entire bike, all the nuts and bolts, every time, before you ride. Nighthawk reminded everyone again to watch out for school zones. He mentioned that eight children have already gone down since Christmas break. Be sure to take care and slow down.

State Representative's Report: Critter said that the 21st Annual Freedom Rights Rally is February 12, 2018 in Tallahassee. This is also the State Meeting weekend. This meeting is on a Sunday and the ride to the Capitol is on Monday. If anyone is interested in going on the ride contact Critter or Magneto. Information is also available on the State website. It's important that we get as many bike as we can in Tallahasee in ordeer to show the legislatures the voting power behind ABATE of Florida.

Products Report: Wavy said that anyone who is interested in doing Products, come to the Vintage Motorcycle Show. He will show you what is involved and how to do it. He said Critter helped him organize it, so it isn't hard.

Membership Report: Sheila Rose reported that membership is going well. We had 7 new members and 5 renewals for December. Five of the new ones were from the Toys in the Sun Run. So far, for January we have 2 new member and 9 renewals. We hope to get quite a few new members at the Vintage Motorcycle Show.

Events Coordinator: This position is open.

Newsletter Distribution: Poppie was excused.

Legislative Report: Brad mentioned that it is a busy time in the legislature. The auto-cycle bill is now on a special calendar, which means it will be voted on soon. These are the three-wheeled cars that they want to reclassify as motorcycles. The vulnerable road user's bill is now being pushed through as an enhanced penalties bill. The word motorcycle has been taken out of the bill so it no longer pertains to us. The ban on red light cameras has passed the House and will most likely pass in the Senate. The repeal of PIP insurance will likely pass, which would mean Florida would no longer be a "no-fault" state. The repeal would mean motorists would be required to carry bodily injury coverage in place of PIP.

<u>Legal Counsel</u>: Brad said there is talk about restoration of civil rights for convicted felons. They are working on some clemency for them which would be determined on a case by case basis.

<u>Public Relations:</u> Fern mentioned that the Der Krieger Annual on January 28, 2018. They only have one party a year and the membership should try to

show up and support them.

Billing and Invoicing: Sheila reported that all advertisers are up to date.

Social Director: Sandy brought a cake for the January birthdays. Please be sure to stay for the birthday party after the meeting.

Quartermaster's Report: Bob Anz will have coffee for our next event.

Photographer's Report: Barry has been taking pictures and will be turning them over to Critter.

Webmaster's Report: Rogue was excused.

TEN ISSUES TO WATCH IN 2018 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

THE CAPITAL, TALLAHASSEE, January 4, 2018....... Florida lawmakers will start the 2018 legislative session Tuesday, with Gov. Rick Scott giving his annual State of the State address.

During the subsequent two months, the House and Senate will negotiate a state budget and consider hundreds of bills. Here are 10 big issues to watch as the session moves forward:

BUDGET: Scott has proposed an \$87.4 billion spending plan for the fiscal year that starts July 1. The proposal includes politically popular ideas such as boosting education funding and providing tax cuts. But the proposal is only a starting point for lawmakers, who are expected to face a tight budget. A September analysis estimated a slim \$52 million surplus for the coming year --- and that did not account for the state's costs from Hurricane Irma.

ENVIRONMENT: Eyeing money from a 2014 constitutional amendment about land and water conservation, lawmakers will consider a series of proposals that could shield property from development and restore waterways. For example, Senate budget chief Rob Bradley, R-Fleming Island, has proposed spending \$100 million a year on the Florida Forever program and wants to set aside \$50 million a year for the restoration of the St. Johns River, its tributaries and the Keystone Heights lake region in North Florida.

HEALTH CARE: House Republican leaders likely will renew a push to ease health-care regulations, an effort they say would help increase access to care and lower costs. Examples include eliminating the "certificate of need" approval process for hospital building projects and ending a restriction on patients staying overnight at ambulatory surgical centers. Such proposals, however, have died in recent years in the Senate amid opposition from parts of the hospital industry.


HIGHER EDUCATION: Senate President Joe Negron, R-Stuart, has made a top priority of revamping the higher-education system and will continue seeking changes during his final term. Senators are expected to quickly approve a bill that would make permanent an expansion of Bright Futures scholarships and take steps to further bolster need-based aid. Negron also wants changes such as holding universities to a four-year graduation standard in performance funding.

HURRICANE IRMA: When Hurricane Irma smashed into Florida on Sept. 10, it reset priorities for the 2018 legislative session. Lawmakers are considering dozens of ideas for responding to Irma and preparing for future storms. For instance, they are looking at possibly providing financial help to the agriculture industry, which took at least a \$2.5 billion hit in Irma. They also will grapple with Scott's push to require long-term care facilities to have generators and fuel to keep buildings cool when electricity goes out.

INSURANCE: Insurance lobbyists will try to persuade lawmakers to revamp laws dealing with a controversial practice known as "assignment of benefits," which the industry blames for increased property-insurance costs. The practice involves policyholders signing over benefits to contractors, who then pursue payment from insurers --- often leading to disputes and lawsuits. Lawmakers also will consider renewed proposals to eliminate the state's no-fault auto insurance system.

K-12 EDUCATION: House Speaker Richard Corcoran, R-Land O' Lakes, has made clear he wants to continue expanding school-choice programs, which draw opposition from Democrats and many public-school officials. The House has started moving forward with a bill that would offer voucher-like scholarships to students who are bullied in public schools. Meanwhile, the House and Senate face a key budget disagreement on the use of increased property-tax revenues in funding public schools.

OPIOID EPIDEMIC: With overdoses skyrocketing and families being torn apart, lawmakers will look for ways to address the state's opioid epidemic. Scott wants to spend \$53 million to address the issue, with much of the money going to substance-abuse treatment. Scott and lawmakers also could place limits on initial opioid prescriptions that doctors write for patients. The idea is to prevent patients from getting hooked on prescription painkillers and then moving onto potentially deadly street drugs.

TAX CUTS: Since taking office in 2011, Scott has made cutting taxes a hallmark of his administration. As he enters his final legislative session, Scott has proposed \$180 million in tax and fee cuts. The proposal, however, does not include major changes in the tax system. Instead, it includes a 10-day sales tax "holiday" for back-to-school shoppers and reductions in motorist-related fees, including fees for obtaining and renewing driver's licenses.

TEXTING WHILE DRIVING: Lawmakers in recent years have repeatedly rejected efforts to toughen the state's ban on texting while driving. But the issue has a better chance of passing during the 2018 session after Corcoran announced that he supports making texting while driving a "primary" offense. Currently, it is a "secondary" offense, meaning motorists can only be cited if they are pulled over for other reasons. But if it is a primary offense, police would be able to stop motorists for texting behind the wheel. (For more information on the texting ban, see page 23)

TOUGHER TEXTING WHILE DRIVING BAN MOVES IN HOUSE

With support from the House speaker, a proposal to make texting while driving a "primary" offense in Florida received unanimous support Tuesday from a House panel as the 2018 legislative session opened. The House Transportation & Infrastructure Subcommittee approved the measure (HB 33), which would allow law-enforcement officers to stop vehicles when they see motorists texting behind the wheel.

"This will prevent the actual behavior of texting behind the wheel," said Rep. Emily Slosberg, a Boca Raton Democrat who is co-sponsoring the bill with Rep. Jackie Toledo, R-Tampa. "Because right now, it's completely unenforceable as a secondary offense."

Currently, motorists can only be charged with texting and driving if they are stopped for other offenses, such as speeding. The bill, which must still go before two more panels, advanced despite concern by St. Petersburg Democrat Wengay Newton --- a committee member who voted for the bill --- who said the change from a secondary to primary offense could be used to racially profile African-Americans. "I know the inference of having the safety." Newton, who is black, said. "I get it. But at the same time, when you talk about how it affects everybody in the state ... there are a lot that look like me that I want to ensure get a fair shake."

Also, some supporters of the texting-while-driving ban would prefer lawmakers require motorists to be "hands free" from electronic devices. They also contend the House proposal could prevent law enforcement from inspecting electronic devices if drivers simply claim they were using allowed GPS rather than typing messages. "There's just too many loopholes in it," said Demetrius Branca, whose 19-year-old son Anthony Branca was killed by a distracted driver just over three years ago in Tallahassee. "In my mind, distracted driving, the core of it, is no different than drunk driving. You are doing something that you know to be dangerous, and you are endangering everyone around you."

The House bill would allow motorists to text while in stationary vehicles and would require lawenforcement officers to inform drivers they have a right to decline a search of the wireless devices. The measure also would prohibit officers from confiscating handheld devices without warrants. The civil liberty protections were important for many lawmakers. Bills in the past to toughen texting-while-driving laws have failed to advance in the Republican-dominated Legislature.

Slosberg said after the meeting she'd prefer a "hands free" requirement and for charges to be criminal, but she said the bill had been negotiated and needs to be viewed as "a step in the right direction." "We're moving the needle," added Toledo, who noted her stepson bragged that he knew he couldn't be pulled over for texting while driving unless he was committing a separate offense. "That's when I'm thinking we need harsher legislation," Toledo said. "We need to be clear with our children that you cannot text and drive."

The proposal got a major boost in December when House Speaker Richard Corcoran announced his support. The Land O' Lakes Republican said that as the father of six children, including two teens who have driver licenses, he has become convinced by statistics showing the dangers of texting while driving, particularly for younger drivers.

NO-FAULT INSURANCE REPEAL GETS SENATE BACKING

TALLAHASSEE --- An effort to eliminate the state's "no-fault" auto insurance system got rolling Wednesday (Jan. 10) in the Senate, amid concerns the change would not significantly lower rates. Also, questions continue over the fate of the Senate proposal (SB 150) because of medical coverage requirements that are not included in a similar measure (HB 19), which is teed up for a vote by the full House.

No-Fault Insurance States



The Senate Banking and Insurance Committee on Wednesday voted 10-1 to support the bill by Sen. Tom Lee, R-Thonotosassa. It would repeal the no-fault law, which requires motorists to carry \$10,000 in personal-injury protection, or PIP, coverage to help pay medical expenses after accidents. "I'm trying to make sure we don't raise premiums on Floridians, but at the same token that we protect as many options for consumers to get medical care in the event of an accident," Lee said after the meeting. "It's a balancing act."

The proposal must still go before two more committees before reaching the Senate floor.

Since a 2012 effort to reform the no-fault system --- championed by Gov. Rick Scott and then-state Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater --- efforts have increased in Tallahassee to replace it with a tort-based system. The 2012 law, in part, required people involved in crashes to seek treatment within 14 days, put a \$2,500 cap on coverage for non-emergency conditions, eliminated massage therapists and acupuncturists from getting paid for medical coverage and set new requirements for chiropractic visits.

The 2012 changes were considered a last-ditch effort to maintain the no-fault system after rates increased because of fraudulent claims. Lee's measure would require motorists to carry \$5,000 in what is known as medical payments coverage, or MedPay, and minimum amounts of bodily-injury coverage that would increase over time.

Sen. Rene Garcia, R-Hialeah, called his vote for the measure a "soft yes," saying he will continue to seek lower projected premium increases. "Insurance rates will go up for those that have just PIP policies," Garcia said. "So, that means that a lot of us in the minority communities, for a lot of us that live in South Florida, some of those rates for those that have insurance just PIP-only policies, their rates will go up." Under Lee's MedPay rules, people would be required to seek medical attention within 14 days of injuries occurring. Through an amendment, Garcia was able to attach language to the bill that would allow MedPay to also cover chiropractic and dental costs.

Mark Delegal, a lobbyist representing State Farm, which is opposed to the Senate proposal, called Lee's amended measure "PIP version 2.0" and warned that the system will remain "costly and inefficient." "You're throwing that right back on it, with a broad spectrum of providers, and without knowing the costs of that up front," Delegal said. "It's going to be unaffordable to a lot of people."

Lee's proposal is estimated to initially raise rates about \$4 a year, as the savings from the elimination of no-fault would be offset by increases in premiums for bodily-injury liability coverage and uninsured-motorist coverage. "You could lower insurance premiums, if that was our solitary goal, by gutting insurance coverage and having people drive around with almost no coverage," Lee said. "The question is what is the most efficient system."

The House measure sponsored by Rep. Erin Grall, R-Vero Beach, faces opposition from some insurers, business groups and medical providers. It has been projected to save motorists on average about \$80 a year. Grall's proposal, which was backed by the House Commerce Committee in an 18-7 vote last month, would eliminate the system's limits on lawsuits. Drivers at fault in accidents would be fully liable for damages, with the minimum bodily-injury coverage under Grall's proposal being \$25,000 for damages for injury or death of one person and \$50,000 for injury or death of two or more people.

Lee's proposal, starting Jan. 1, 2019, would set a minimum of \$20,000 for bodily injury protection that includes coverage for the injury or death of one person and \$40,000 for injury or death of two or more people. Individual premiums would be expected to increase as the minimum coverage would grow to \$25,000 and \$50,000 two years later and to \$30,000 and \$60,000 on Jan. 1, 2023.

Election 2018 Update

From our State V.P. & Legislative Rep Darrin "Scribe" Brooks

REPUBLICAN DESANTIS LAUNCHES GUBERNATORIAL BID U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis filed paperwork Friday to formally enter Florida's 2018 gubernatorial race, after landing praise from President Donald Trump and rounding up a list of wealthy financial backers. DeSantis, a Palm Coast Republican, opened accounts that will allow him to raise money for a primary contest that already includes state Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam and is expected to be joined by House Speaker Richard Corcoran. "As somebody who is a military officer, an Iraq veteran, a proven conservative, and then with the support of the president, I'm in a position to exercise the leadership that can build on the great work that Gov. Rick Scott has done to advance economic opportunity, reform education and to drain the swamp in Tallahassee, which needs to be drained just like Washington," DeSantis said during an appearance Friday on the Fox News show "Fox & Friends." An official campaign kick-off will occur later this month, a release from his campaign said.

DEMOCRAT TOPS \$78,000 IN MIAMI-DADE HOUSE RACE Democrat Javier Fernandez raked in more than \$78,000 during a six-week period as he began his special-election campaign for a Miami-Dade County House seat. Fernandez raised \$78,510 from Nov. 17 through Thursday for the race in House District 114, a seat that opened when Coral Gables Democrat Daisy Baez resigned from the Legislature in November. Fernandez is one of four candidates seeking the seat. Republicans Andrew Vargas and Jose Pazos will square off in a Feb. 20 GOP primary, with the winner running against Fernandez and unaffiliated candidate Liz de las Cuevas in a May 1 special general election. Vargas raised \$18,500 from Nov. 1 through Thursday, while Pazos raised \$3,050, newly filed finance reports show. De las Cuevas raised \$5,165 during the period. Baez stepped down after pleading guilty to a perjury charge in an investigation into her residency.

VARGAS LEADS GOP FUNDRAISING IN MIAMI-DADE SPECIAL ELECTION Preparing for a Feb. 20 special primary election in a Miami-Dade County House district, Republican Andrew Vargas has continued to build a fundraising edge over GOP opponent Jose Pazos, according to newly filed finance reports. Vargas raised \$18,500 from Nov. 28 through Thursday, bringing his overall total to \$154,823. Contributions during the month-long period included \$3,000 from divisions of the HCA health-care chain and \$3,000 from political-action committees linked to the Florida Justice Association trial-lawyers group. Pazos, meanwhile, raised \$3,050 during the period, bringing his overall total to \$16,750, the reports filed with the state Division of Elections show. Vargas and Pazos are running in House District 114, which opened in November when former Rep. Daisy Baez, D-Coral Gables, resigned after pleading guilty to a perjury charge in an investigation into her residency. The winner of the Republican primary will face Democrat Javier Fernandez and unaffiliated candidate Liz de las Cuevas in a May 1 special general election. Updated finance information had only been posted Tuesday morning for the Republican candidates.

Tougher Texting While Driving Ban Moves In House Continued from page 23

The state Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles reported nearly 50,000 distracted-driving crashes in 2016 in Florida, including 233 deaths. Slosberg sought a texting-while-driving ban in the 2017 session and has spent the past several months urging support from local governments. More than 20 counties and nearly 30 cities approved resolutions in support of making texting while driving a primary offense.

For Slosberg, efforts to increase traffic safety are also personal. On Feb. 23, 1996, Slosberg and her twin sister, Dori, got into a car with friends. The driver, 19, was speeding 90 mph in a 50 mph zone when the car struck a median and crashed into a car heading east. Emily Slosberg survived the crash with a punctured lung and several broken bones. Dori was killed along with four other teenagers.

The bill does not alter existing fines --- \$30 plus court costs for a first non-moving violation and \$60, court costs and three points on a driver's license on a second offense within five years of the first. By not changing the fines, the House measure is closer in line with a Senate bill (SB 90) by Sen. Keith Perry, R-Gainesville, that will go before the Senate Transportation Committee on Wednesday.

HOUSE TO MOVE QUICKLY ON `SANCTUARY CITIES' A bill aimed at "sanctuary cities" will be one of the first items of business for the Florida House when the 60-day legislative session begins next week. House Speaker Richard Corcoran, R-Land O' Lakes, said Tuesday on Twitter that the proposal (HB 9) will pass quickly. "Sanctuary cities are a threat to the safety of our communities," Corcoran tweeted. "On week one of session the Florida House will pass a bill that will enforce the rule of law." The proposal, sponsored by Rep. Larry Metz, R-Yalaha, would require state and local agencies to cooperate with federal immigration enforcement and would bar sanctuary policies. It drew quick praise from Corcoran in November after getting approval from the House Judiciary Committee, the only committee that heard the bill. The House has approved similar measures the past two sessions, but the proposals have died in the Senate. The House Republican position has drawn heavy opposition from Democrats and immigrant advocates who argue, in part, that the bill would lead to racial profiling by authorities.

OTHER LAWMAKERS MAY PICK UP HAHNFELDT BILLS House members will be able to pick up legislation filed by the late Rep. Don Hahnfeldt without it counting against their session limit. Speaker Richard Corcoran, R-Land O' Lakes, announced in a memo to members that a motion will be made on Jan. 9, the opening day of the annual legislative session, that will allow measures filed by Hahnfeldt to receive new sponsors. Also, those measures won't count against a six-bill limit for House members. Corcoran noted he consulted with Minority Leader Janet Cruz, D-Tampa, before making the announcement. "As with any other piece of legislation, these bills will be evaluated and advanced through the committee process on their merits," Corcoran said. Hahnfeldt, a Republican from The Villages, died of cancer on Dec. 24. He was 73. He was the primary sponsor for five bills and five additional proposals seeking money for projects in his district. Rep. Lori Berman, D-Lantana, has already announced she intends to move forward with a bill (HB 1029) seeking to raise the legal age for smoking from 18 to 21. Berman and Hahnfeldt co-sponsored the measure.

Editor's Note: Rep. Hahnfeldt HB419, which seeks to require insurance for motorcycles. That bill has been picked up by Rep. Daniel Perez - District 116.

All motorcyclists are welcomed and encouraged to participate in the many meetings, seminars and group discussions that focus on legislative efforts and litigation techniques to protect our riders' rights and preserve Freedom of the Road.

Agenda items will cover legal and legislative issues, with Special Meetings for Veterans Affairs, Women in Motorcycling, Clean & Sober Roundtable and World of Sport Bikes, as well as the Christian Unity Conference and Confederation of Clubs Patch Holders Meeting.

NCOM has successfully outreached to numerous segments of the motorcycling community in an effort to unite for our rights, in both the courthouse and statehouse, and has become a unifying voice amongst North America's motorcycle rights organizations (MROs), motorcycle clubs, women riders, religious riding organizations, touring groups, trikers, sportbikers, and minority motorcyclists.

SECOND BIKER SET FOR TRIAL IN WACO REJECTS PLEA DEAL Following a hung jury in the first of 171 Twin Peaks cases to go to court, resulting in a declared mistrial, the second defendant set for trial on charges stemming from the deadly May 17, 2015 shooting has rejected a plea deal.

Dallas trucker George "Scooter" Bergman declined a deal in court to plea to a misdemeanor with one year probation, and the District Attorney dropping murder charges, but he instead demanded his day in court by pleading not guilty to engaging in organized criminal activity resulting in deaths and injuries. Nine bikers were killed and 20 injured in the 2015 shootout involving police and bikers at the Twin Peaks restaurant in Waco, Texas.

Describing how he was on his way to the bathroom when the first shots rang out, and how he ducked for cover until the firing stopped, Bergman says "How can I say I am guilty for something when that is what I did?" Defense attorney Clint Broden says the state has no evidence against his client "other than he was present at Twin Peaks and was wearing a motorcycle jacket."

The prosecutor's office has since sought a continuance of the case until July, after the upcoming March 6 election primary, in a move many believe is so the D.A. doesn't suffer a loss or another mistrial before facing local voters.

Last November, Bandidos MC leader Christopher "Jake" Carrizal was the first biker to face trial. The jury in that case told the judge that even after several hours of deliberation they could not reach a unanimous verdict, which forced the judge to declare a mistrial.

STUDY URGES MOTORCYCLE AWARENESS TRAINING IN DRIVER'S ED Motorcycle awareness should be included in all driver training and increased in safety campaigns, according to the authors of an Australian National University study which found that drivers are twice as likely to miss seeing a motorcycle compared with a taxi and admit they do not expect to see motorcyclists.

Referred to it as "inattentional blindness" resulting in "looked-but-failed-to-see" (LBFTS) crashes, these are the most common type of collision involving motorcycles, according to the 2017 US Motorcycle Crash Causation Study.

Now, a new Australian National University study, "Allocating Attention to Detect Motorcycles: The Role of Inattentional Blindness", has found that drivers are overloaded with more sensory information than the brain can handle. "So our brain has to decide what information is most important," the study reports.

Researchers showed photographs of "safe" or "unsafe" situations involving a motorcycle and a taxi, and 65% did not detect the motorcycle while only 31% did not notice the taxi. In other experiments, drivers modulated their attention to accommodate motorcycles when necessary, suggesting that motorcycles are given the least amount of attention.

Participants said they believed a motorcycle was just as likely to be on the road as a taxi, but admitted they would be far less likely to notice the motorcycle. However, participants who have a motorcycle license were more likely to notice the motorcycles.

"Motorcycles appear to be very low on the priority list for the brain when it is filtering information," University researcher Kristen Pammer says. Co-authors say their study highlights the need to encourage drivers to be more motorcycle-aware with special training for novice drivers to "put motorcyclists higher on the brain 'radar' of the driver."

Pammer notes many ways drivers can be made rideraware, including advertising campaigns. "I would put it into driver training programs where everyone who drives must also experience what it is like to ride a motorbike," she says, adding that "If we could have everyone pass a simulator motorbike riding test -- I bet it would make a big difference."

TRAFFIC STOP 101 REQUIRED LEARNING A

legislative trend has started amongst states passing laws requiring licensees be taught the basics of being pulled over, and by knowing what to do drivers can avoid negative interactions with law enforcement during traffic stops. As of the New Year, three more states have introduced such legislation.

In Kentucky, HB104 would require that a driver's education program includes "instruction regarding a driver's conduct during interactions with law enforcement officers" and amend the state's Driver Manual to contain the information needed for an operator's license examination; and require driver training schools to include it in the course of instruction for new drivers. House Bill 104 was introduced January 2nd and referred to the House Judiciary Committee.

House Bill 1244 in Missouri "Requires driver's license examiners to demonstrate to applicants what he or she is likely to experience during a traffic stop and requires driver's education providers to include curriculum on traffic stops."

Likewise, S7239 in New York would mandate "driver education courses to include a description of law enforcement procedures during traffic stops and the actions a motorist shall take during such stop including appropriate interactions with such officers." It was introduced January 5th in the Senate and referred to the Transportation Committee.

SLUMPING BIKE SALES BLAMED ON UNCLE SAM

"To say sales of new motorcycles have been slow is an understatement right up there with advising the captain of the Titanic that there's a 'little leak' down in the hold," observes the National Motorists Association (www.motorists.org), then rhetorically asking 'Why?" in a recent blog..."Could it be ... Uncle?"

"It is because of Uncle that motorcycling isn't what it was once -- freeing, in particular," claims NMA columnist Eric Peters, adding that it has also become too expensive for Millennials -- the next-up generation that ought to be swelling the new rider ranks, but aren't, because they're already saddled with plenty of debt.

Some telling statistics indicate the median age of a rider today is 47 -- up from 32 in 1990 -- and even more alarming is that the number of first-time/new riders in the 18-24 cohort of people who will form the backbone of the buyer base for the next 20-30 years is down from 16% of the total pool back in 1990 to a depressing 6% today. Probably because they can't afford it, says NMA.

"Motorcycling has become not-cheap for several reasons -- all traceable to Uncle."

Bikes are now mandated to have the same expensepadding equipment -- especially anti-pollution equipment like cars have had for decades, even though motorcycles overall have a negligible impact on the environment because of small engines in small numbers.

"New bikes must now be very much like new cars -- computer-controlled EFI, catalytic converters...They are not only expensive as a result -- especially to service, which most people can no longer do themselves."

So instead of being an inexpensive hands-on experience, motorcycling is becoming the pastime of the old -- and affluent.

The median household income of a motorcycle owner is now \$62,200 according to stats compiled by the Motley Fool and 65% bring in more than \$50,000. That largely rules out the 18-24 crowd (Millennials) as a class. It's not that they "don't like motorcycles," as asserted by some analysts... "It's simply that they can't afford them anymore."

GM TO LAUNCH SELF-DRIVING CARS BY 2019

General Motors has filed a petition asking the federal government permission to deploy self-driving cars on U.S. roadways without backup drivers or any manual controls.

The U.S. auto manufacturer announced it will mass produce vehicles without steering wheels or pedals, and that it plans on rolling them out in 2019. Some other autonomous cars allow human drivers to take control if something goes wrong.

All vehicles that are allowed to operate on public roads must meet the Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards -- 16 of which include human-driver-based requirements. GM is asking NHTSA to allow the company to meet those safety standards through alternate means -- a process that the U.S. House of Representatives intends to include in a self-driving bill that was recently passed.

GM is facing competition from Google, which started testing driverless cars on public roads late last year.

The petition is the latest step toward the company's goal of deploying a commercial robotaxi service. GM wants

permission from federal regulators to begin testing driverless robo-cabs on public roads, starting in 2019; a move that could position the Detroit automaker as one of the leaders in the development of autonomous vehicle technology.

"We believe this is a pretty notable milestone on the journey to AV deployment where we're talking about a real production car with no manual controls," said GM President Dan Ammann, adding that, "this technology will have a huge impact on the world."

GM's announcement came on the same day the Boston Consulting Group issued a new report looking at the impact technologies like autonomous driving and electrified vehicles will have on the auto industry over the next two decades. Among other things, the study forecast that about 20% of the miles Americans travel by automobile in 2035 will be in robo-cabs operated by ride-sharing services.

AIRBAG SUITS NOW MANDATORY IN MOTORCYCLE RACING Motorcycle suits with airbag technology have been used voluntarily by most of the world's fastest riders for nearly a decade, though never mandatory, but that has now changed for all classes across the 2018 MotoGP World Championship races.

Thanks to a new official ruling by governing body Fédération Internationale de Motocyclisme (FIM), the high-tech devices are becoming mandatory across the board in MotoGP, Moto2, and Moto3 for the 2018 season. The FIM's new mandate states that all full-time riders must wear leathers fitted with an airbag system at all times during every session.

The new regulations also require that every airbag system pass a series of rigorous tests which each manufacturer is responsible for self-certifying that its respective suit passes all regulations and standards.

"These regulations mark yet another step towards increased rider safety, with the FIM, IRTA and Dorna all committed to making sure MotoGP is as safe as possible -- and always evolving," according to MotoGP.


